

Health Care Workforce Census Acupuncturists 2024

January 2025


Overview

This acupuncture census is part of the Vermont Department of Health's health care provider data program, which is used to monitor and measure the supply of health care providers in our state over time.

Vermont acupuncturists are relicensed every two years. Data for this report were obtained during the January 2024 relicensing period and represent a snapshot of the profession at that time.

Acupuncture is a form of alternative medicine in which thin needles are inserted into the body. It is a key component of Traditional Chinese Medicine. It is used for a wide range of conditions, but most often for pain relief. Acupuncture is generally used in combination with other forms of treatment.

Workforce

- 215 acupuncturists renewed their licenses during the survey period and all but one of them completed the workforce survey for a response rate of 99.5%.
- Of the 214 respondents, 162 (75.7%) indicate they are actively practicing as acupuncturists in Vermont.
- Of the 52 respondents reporting a non-active status, 19 (39.6%) indicate plans to start work as an acupuncturist in Vermont within the next 12 months.
- The remainder of this report is based on 162 acupuncturists who report actively working in Vermont.

Full Time Equivalents (FTEs)


- 160 acupuncturists provide 92.9 total FTEs.
- 14.8% of acupuncturists (24) work 40 or more hours per week at their main site.
- 22.4 FTEs, or 24.1% of total FTEs, are provided by 48 acupuncturists aged 60 or older.

Trends in Statewide FTEs

- Acupuncturist FTEs increased from 75.3 in 2016 to 101.5 in 2022.
- From 2022 to 2024, FTEs decreased by 8.6 to 92.9.
- FTEs are 23.4% higher in 2024 than in 2016, despite the decrease from 2022 to 2024.

Acupuncturist FTEs by Year




Demographics

Gender

• 71.3% of the acupuncturists in Vermont are female (112), and 23.6% (37) are male.

Age

- The median age is 51.
- 6.8% (11) are under 35 years of age.
- 52.5% (85) are between 35 and 54 years of age.
- 40.8% (66) are 55 years of age and older.

Race and Ethnicity

Respondents were asked to select their race and could select multiple responses or choose not to answer. Therefore, numbers may not equal the total number of acupuncturists.

- 130 acupuncturists (80.7%) are white, 3 (1.9%) are Asian, 3 (1.9%) are American Indian or Alaskan Native, and none are Black, Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander. Four prefer to self-describe and 20 (12.4%) prefer not to answer the question.
- Three acupuncturists (1.9%) identify as Hispanic, Latino/a, or of Spanish origin.

Education and Training

- 39.8% (64) completed their degrees in the Northeast.
- 38.5% (62) completed their degrees in the West.
- 73.5% (119) have earned an MA degree.
- 81.5% (132) are certified by the National Commission for the Certification of Acupuncture and Oriental Medicine (NCCAOM).

Practice Characteristics

Number of sites

- 83.1% (133) of acupuncturists work at a single practice site.
- 16.9% (27) also work at a second site.

Practice Setting

 73.5% (119) of acupuncturists work in a private solo practice, and 21.6% (35) work in a private group practice.

Specialties

- Most acupuncturists (132) are in general practice (81.5%).
- 7.4% of acupuncturists (12) specialize in pain management, and 3.1% (5) specialize in sports-related acupuncture.

Access to Care

• Most acupuncturists (147) work at a main site that accepts new patients (91.3%).

Current Experience

- Median time since first licensed as an acupuncturist: 18 years.
- 26 acupuncturists have an additional Vermont health care provider license, and two acupuncturists have two additional licenses.
 - o 15 acupuncturists (9.3%) also have a Vermont Naturopathic Physician license.
 - Other licenses include massage therapist (held by 4 acupuncturists), chiropractor (3), nurse practitioner (2), registered nurse (3), or a mental health license (3).

Future Plans

- 63.7% (102) plan to continue working as they have been in the next 12 months.
- 23.8% (38) plan to increase their hours in the next 12 months.
- 5.6% (9) plan to reduce their hours and one plans to retire.

Key Takeaways

- Acupuncturists in Vermont are a median age of 51 and are predominately female. There is little difference in the median age of males (52) and females (51).
- The most common settings for acupuncturists are private solo practices and private group practices.
- Relative to population, acupuncturists are most common in Washington, Chittenden and Windham counties.
- Despite a decrease from 2022 to 2024, acupuncturist FTEs have increased substantially over time, with a total increase of 17.6 in FTEs between 2016 and 2024 (23.4%).

Appendix

Active Acupuncturists

An acupuncturist who reported working in Vermont as an acupuncturist (regardless of how many hours) is considered active.

Census

The census was taken during the biennial acupuncturist relicensing process which ended on January 31, 2024. The data include all licensed acupuncturists except for new licensees enrolled less than three months before the renewal date (November 2023 - January 2024), as their license was valid until the next renewal date of January 31, 2026. Census questions are available upon request.

Full Time Equivalent (FTE)

Full time is defined as 40 or more working hours in Vermont per week, 48 weeks or more per year. An acupuncturist reporting more than 40 hours per week is defined as one FTE regardless of the number of hours over 40 per week worked.

Geographical Regions

States were grouped into the following regions:

Northeast: VT, ME, MA, NH, RI, CT, NJ, NY, PA

Central: IN, IL, MI, OH, WI, IA, KS, MN, MO, NE, ND, SD

South: DE, DC, FL, GA, MD, NC, SC, VA, WV, AL, KY, MS, TN, AR, LA, OK, TX

West: AZ, CO, ID, NM, MT, UT, NV, WY, AK, CA, HI, OR, WA

Main Practice, Site, Setting, and Specialty

The main practice, site, setting, or specialty refer to the practice in which the acupuncturist worked the greatest number of annual hours.

Map Quartiles

Map colors define quartiles. The lowest 25% of FTE equivalents to population ratio is displayed in the lightest color, the middle 50% in medium, and highest 25% in the darkest color.

Missing data

Unless otherwise noted, missing data are excluded from tables. Thus, totals may vary from table to table.

Population Estimates

Population estimates are for July 2023 and were provided by the Department of Health.

Weekly Hours

Average weekly hours are based on hours and weeks reported, adjusted to a full-time 48-week working year (hours * (weeks/48)). Thus, the average weekly hours for an acupuncturist working 40 hours a week for half the year (24 weeks), is 20.
