

# Health Care Workforce Census Dental Hygienists, 2023



## **Overview**

This dental hygienist census is part of the Vermont Department of Health's healthcare provider data program, which is used to monitor and measure the supply of health care providers in our state over time. Vermont dental hygienists are relicensed every two years. Data for this report was obtained during the September 2023 relicensing period and represents a snapshot of the profession at that time.

Dental hygienists, working under the general supervision of a licensed dentist, provide screening procedures, teeth cleaning and other dental care, and oral health education to their patients.

## **Workforce**

- 622 hygienists renewed their licenses during the surveyed period, and all completed the workforce census for a response rate of 100%.
- Out of 622 respondents, 553 (89%) indicated they are actively practicing as hygienists in Vermont.
- 26% of hygienists that are not currently providing care in Vermont indicated they planned to do so within the next 12 months.
- The remainder of this report is based on the 553 active hygienists who reported providing direct patient care in Vermont.

# **Full Time Equivalents (FTEs)**


- 553 hygienists provide 402.8 FTEs.
- Most hygienists (73%) work 20 to 39 hours a week at their work locations.
- 11% of hygienists work 40 hours or more at their work locations.
- 55.9 FTEs, (14%) of total hygienist FTEs, are provided by the 90 dental hygienists ages 60 or older.

## **Trends in Statewide FTEs**

- Hygienist FTEs increased by 16.9 from 398.2 in 2015 to 415.1 in 2017.
- FTEs dropped to 402.4 in 2021.
- In 2023, FTEs increased for the first time since 2017, but the increase was very small (less than 1 FTE).

# **Demographics**


#### Gender

- 97% of active hygienists are female.
- 2% of active hygienists are male.
- 1% of active hygienists preferred not to answer.

## Age

 Median age of active hygienists is 45. This is younger than many other VT health professionals.

# Race and ethnicity

Dental hygienists were asked to select their race and could select multiple responses or choose not to answer, so numbers may not equal the total number of hygienists.

- 93% of dental hygienists are white, 1% are Asian, and 0.2% are American Indian or Alaska Native or Black, 31 preferred not to answer or did not answer, and two people selected a race that was not listed (one Mediterranean, one Portuguese/Italian).
- 1% of dental hygienists are Hispanic, Latino/a, or of Spanish origin, and 94% are not.
- 27 hygienists preferred not to answer or were missing data about ethnicity.

# **Education and Training**

- 78% of dental hygienists have an associate degree.
- 22% of dental hygienists have a bachelor's degree or higher.
- 71% of dental hygienists received their schooling in VT.

## **Practice Characteristics**

#### Number of sites

- 88% (487) work at a single location.
- 11% (60) work at two locations.
- 1% (7) work at three or more locations.

# **Practice setting**

- 85% (470) of hygienists' main practice setting were in dental practices.
- 85% (467) provided primary care (general or pediatric dentistry) at their main site.

- Median years licensed in Vermont: 15.
- 27% of hygienists in Vermont have been licensed here for over 25 years.

# **Future Plans**

- 85% are planning to continue working the same number of hours as they are currently in the next 12 months.
- 4% are planning to increase hours.
- 6% are planning to decrease hours.
- 2% are planning to seek employment in a different field, stop working in VT, or retire.

# **Key Takeaways**

- Chittenden County has the largest hygienist FTE per 100,000 population ratio at 95.5 - most other counties in VT have an FTE per population ratio around half of that.
- Hygienists are one of the younger health professions in VT: Only 16% are 60+.
- There was an increase in hygienist FTEs from 2015 to 2017, followed by a decrease in FTEs through 2021. FTEs from 2021 to 2023 increased slightly for the first time since 2017.
- Hygienists in VT are one of the younger health professional groups with a median age of 45.

## **Appendix**

## Active hygienist

A hygienist who reported working in Vermont as such (regardless of how many hours) is considered active.

#### Census

The census was taken during the biennial hygienist relicensing process which ended on September 30, 2023. The data include all licensed hygienists except for new licensees enrolled less than three months before the renewal date (June–August 2023), as their license was valid until the next renewal date of September 30, 2025. Census questions available upon request.

## Full Time Equivalent (FTE)

Full time is defined as 40 or more working hours in Vermont per week, 48 weeks or more per year. Reporting more than 40 hours per week is defined as <u>one</u> FTE regardless of the number of hours over 40 per week worked.

## Maps

For county map, colors define quartiles. The lowest 25% of FTE equivalents to population ratio is displayed in the lightest color, the middle 50% in medium, and highest 25% in the darkest color.

## Missing data

Unless otherwise noted, missing data are excluded from tables. Thus, totals may vary from table to table.

## **Population Estimates**

Population estimates are for July 2022 and were provided by the Department of Health.

## Primary Practice, Site, Setting, and Specialty

The primary or main practice, site, setting, or specialty refer to the practice with the greatest number of reported annual hours per individual.

#### **Weekly Hours**

Average weekly hours is based on hours and weeks reported, adjusted to a full-time 48-week working year (hours \* (weeks/48)). Thus, the average weekly hours for an individual working 40 hours a week for half the year (24 weeks) is 20.
