Their goal is to find problems in the system that might put children at risk, teach people how to keep kids safe, and suggest new laws, rules, or services to help prevent future deaths.

Raising Awareness in Vermont

The Child Fatality Review Team review process helps create strategies to protect children and make sure that deaths that could have been prevented are identified and addressed.





A Team Effort

The Vermont Child Fatality Review Team was formed by the Vermont Legislature and is written into Vermont law under 18 V.S.A. § 1561(a). According to the law, participation is required by several state agencies and departments. Team membership also includes members appointed by the Secretary of Human Services who are experts in child abuse or neglect, health, social work, child care, education, or law enforcement. The Vermont Child Fatality Review Team includes experts from different fields who work together to understand child deaths and find ways to stop them from happening in the future. Their work helps improve community health and prevent serious injuries in children.
