## **GOALS:**


- 1. Offer HIV testing

  - Yet new infections continue to occur.
- 3. Great health outcomes Here In Vermont for individuals who know their HIV status and engage in care.
  - HIV Care, HIV PEP, HIV PrEP, Doxy PEP.

#### New HIV Diagnoses in Vermont 2022 - 2024





# VT PLWDHI with two or more viral loads >200 between 2021-2023 *and* overall VT PLWDHI in 2023







Vermont PLWDHI by Gender, 2023




Individuals with Two or More Viral Load Results > 200 between 2021-2023, by Gender (n=56)

Vermont PLWDHI by County of Residence, 2023


#### Individuals with Two or More Viral Load Results > 200 between 2021-2023, by County of Residence (n=56)




## **Transmission Category**

#### Takeaways

- Older people disproportionately not suppressed
- Females disproportionately not suppressed
  - Heterosexual contact also disproportionately not suppressed
- People of color disproportionately not suppressed
- **IDU** disproportionately not suppressed
- Some cells in the not suppressed group are too small for meaningful comparisons (especially relevant for County of Residence)
